Solution-Oriented Leadership

- Our Role as Teenagers

eadership should begin from teenage years. The saying by a great church leader, Dr. David Oyedepo that "as the morning shows the day, the child shows the man", is indeed apt when talking about leading. Leadership may not be inborn, but the earlier we begin to receive the basic nuggets of leadership from home, school, religious centers, committee of friends, among other groups, the better equipped we are for the future.

Let it also be noted that we do not have to be old to provide leadership. Solution can be provided by anyone. Leadership can begin from

any age. Jesus Christ was a kid when he led in the synagogues to teach the words of wisdom that would later change our world. Samuel Thomas Houghton is a British inventor. In April 2008, at the age of 5, he received a patent for his "Sweeping Device with Two Heads" invention. He is thought to be the youngest person to have been granted a patent for their invention.

Hannah Herbst is a young inventor from Florida. At the age of 13, while attending an engineering summer camp, she envisioned a device that could capture the ocean waves and convert them into electricity. She was inspired by her pen-pal from Sub-Saharan Africa,

an area of the world where many people have little access to reliable electricity. This is how the BEACON project was born. BEACON stands for Bringing Electricity Access to Countries through Ocean Energy (Gonzalex, 2020: https://medium.com/invention-

notebook/5 -young-inventors-aim-to-change-the-world-a8d3e70807d3).

Leadership continues in other social groups, particularly at school. Here, we take up social roles in order of seniority or according to aptitude. Our teachers sometimes use their discretion to assign roles to us. Such discretion is premised on their understanding of our individual potentials or level of activeness.

Sometimes, they appoint even those withdrawn in positions of responsibilities, to bring them out of their shells and make them discover their talents or leadership potentials.

Another social group is circle of friends. Peers

with shared vision or goals engage in role sharing to accomplish tasks or objectives.

In addition to this level is a formal organizations like the World Leadership and Inspirational Foundation, which organizes leadership training kids and teenagers from age 6. At this level, there are academic and social curricular, which

outline leadership-training modules. My immediate younger brother and I have been members of this organisation, where we benefitted immensely from the wisdom and insights of elders, leaders of thought, professionals and captains of industry.

Leadership should begin from a youthful age. Since I came to understand this, I have resolved that I will offer myself to serve humanity, beginning from my family, to the community, the nation and globally.

Every individual has a value he or she can give to

the society. Inherent in humans is something they can contribute to change their society for the better. Giving such value should not be when we are old. It begins now.

Leadership does not mean occupying a position of the boss or manager alone. Leadership actually means taking the lead in service, with

the goal of solving problems. Leadership comes in different ways or models. Charismatic and servant leadership is my favorite. Charisma is required to win people over. Charisma will put you in a position of influence. Servant leadership is the modest position to offer your best for the greater good of the people. My daddy once pinned some wisdom tips on his board in the office, in obvious reference to Dr. Oyedepo's postulation on the qualities of a good leader. I love and will paraphrase them.

Responsibility makes the leader. Sacrifice makes the leader. Reason or rationality makes the leader. Sociability, teamwork and humility make the leader. Discipline makes the leader. Above all, the moral compass (integrity) makes a leader.


I was also challenged with fun and engaging extra-curriculars such as swimming and running, and I represented my class during inter-house sports competitions.




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Optimizing Time, Prioritizing Tasks,

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

They would trust you; they would be able to rely on you. At the same time as a leader, I love taking responsibility because if a leader fails to take responsibility, the leadership trait will not be good enough. You cannot lead without having some challenges or critics but if you are ready at any given time to take responsibility, you would be able to learn even as a leader and be able to mend your ways.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, how did you build in yourself, those leadership values and when did they begin to find expression in you?

Leader: Thank you. I would say that I started building leadership traits right from my very youthful age. I remember that while I was a young girl, I lived with my paternal grandmother who used to encourage me in playing some roles because we used to live in a large family. We have children of my age, a little bit younger, a little bit older but I used to play a leading role in whatever we do in the family back then and while in school as well, I remember starting from the time I was in Primary 5, I started leading morning devotion in the school. That gave me the courage to lead others. At that time I didn't see it as a leadership trait but by the time I started growing up and started working when I got to the

position of Head of Department, there and then I realized that I was becoming a leader. I started having people following me. I started having people that I was mentoring. I started having accolades from people. From then onward and from when I started joining Societies. I happen to be the Chairman of the National Council, Ondo Local Government and this is a very big office. National Council is a body of Societies (Women's societies). It is a worldwide society but I had to be the President of the Local Government Chapter. That was many years back. As a School Principal too, it was the highest ladder of my carrier where I had to lead my vice, I had to lead the Bursar, I had to lead parents, I had to lead students. All these things started manifesting along that line. My political career as well, that was the time I was appointed Adviser to the Chairman for Educational Community Development. At that time, I was leading so many groups of people and to the glory of God, all these traits were manifesting in my leadership.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, where is the place of followership in building those values?

Leader: Thank you. You know that followership takes different shapes. You have followers that would be critics. You have followers that are loyalist. The loyal ones, whether you're right or you're wrong, they keep following you and keep encouraging you. But the critics would at one point or the other try to pull you down but as a leader that is confident in what he or she is doing, as a leader that is upright, as a leader that is focused, one would not allow such to pull her down. You still keep going and keep learning even from their criticism.

Gold: Thank you. It is one thing to build leadership values; it is another thing to exhibit them without compromise. Ma, have you found yourself at a point where you contemplated compromising your leadership values for whatever reason?

Leader: (Laugh) well, when I was in active politics, holding political office, I had lots of challenges that I almost derailed but I thank God that I was able to maneuver myself to maintain my stand. You know, in politics, you meet different types of people with various challenges. You discover at times that the honesty you're talking about may not be paying enough; you may not see the good result expected.

At times, taking responsibility may even land you into trouble in a political circle—at times, not always. I think I remember there was a period when there was a conflict between my mentor in the political circle and the Chairman of the Council. During that period, I had to choose between telling lies and maintaining my integrity but I thank God that at the end, I was able to maintain my integrity, though I lost my appointment and I preferred that. I lost my appointment but I maintained my integrity. It was a bit challenging.


Gold: Ma, who are your mentors?

Leader: My mentors? Hmm, many people. I will start with my paternal grandmother who brought me up because as a child, I grew up with my paternal grandmother. She taught me to be truthful in all I do, to be honest at all times, at a very tender age. Then my father who happens to be a one-time teacher, the King's interpreter, and who had worked with the white men. He was able to give me a kind of mentorship that guided my life. He was a transparent person. You have to be honest, very frank, and very humble at the same time. All these things I learned from them and by the time I got married, I was lucky enough to marry a man who was a great leader himself. My husband was Hon. Feyi Adeyemi is of blessed memory who happened to be a one-time Counselor, and one-time Supervisor and even served as Vice Chairman of the Old Ondo Local Government eventually, he passed on as Area Education Officer of Ondo Local Government. He too was a great leader whom I lived with for the short time that our marriage lasted before I lost him. May his soul rest in peace. I learned a lot from him. So, those were the major mentors I could say I had.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, what are the benefits you have got in exhibiting those leadership qualities?

Leader: You're talking of my achievements using those leadership qualities. One, I have peace of mind. I don't entertain any fear because my honesty, my transparency, and my perseverance have made it easy for me to lead. I do receive accolades from people in different capacities. I receive awards from National Council for Women Society and Lions Club International. In fact, just last December during the Youth Summit in Ondo East, I was appointed and decorated as an Adviser for the Youths for the whole Local Government. This gives me a sort of fulfillment.

awards would be coming in. so, I feel fulfilled.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, what are the challenges you face as a leader and how do you deal with them?

Leader: As a leader, there are bound to be challenges from various angles. You have challenges financially because when you're leading, you have to back it up with empowerment in some cases and when you want to empower people, it usually involves money. So there are times I have a financial challenge. My NGO is to take care of vulnerable and young widows. I do empower them financially and morally because I organize counseling programs and skill acquisition for them. I give them even cash to start petty trade. These are big challenges for me. At the time when I started, I had few bodies that collaborated with me and made it easy but as time went by maybe because of the economic situation of the country, we don't have collaborators anymore. Apart from that, even those you're leading, at times they derail. You put in a lot of effort on some of them and you don't see results. But one thing is to be steadfast as a leader; thank God I have learned to be focused. I don't allow those ones to discourage me. I keep moving. I still persevere, I still endure and I have been able to change some of the situations. Like my NGO that I made as an example, for those that I have settled, all I do now is monitor them and see how they are doing and encourage them. For those that are still under financial stress, I try my best, the little I can, I still give to them to see that I don't leave them the way I met them.

Gold: Criticism is one of the challenges that leaders face. How do you handle criticism as a leader?

Leader: Well personally, I am somebody that has learned to endure a lot in life. When people criticize, I normally take it in good faith because out of their criticism most of the time, when you patiently analyze their criticism, you will still find one correct thing or the other. I patiently take criticism in good faith, analyze it, take responsibility where the need is, make corrections where the need is, and explain where need be but I usually remain focused whether that criticism comes in good faith or not. I still make sure that I remain focused. To the glory of God, the confidence is in me that what I'm doing is right. If peradventure as human beings, there are little hitches here and there, I make amends.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, there's a debate about whether Leaders are born or made. What is your take on that?

Leader: I would say that some leaders are born while some are made. It's both sides. For instance, there are people that are born into royal families. When you're born into a royal family, from the day you're able to talk, you start playing a leadership role as a royal child because you have people around you that you will order. Then you see people around you giving orders, and when you grow along that line, you definitely become a leader. You may turn out to be a good leader; you may turn out to be a bad leader depending on the royal environment in which you're being brought up. On the other hand, people could be made leaders. It's a thing you can learn. You can learn to be a leader. Particularly, you see that many people before they join Societies, they're more or fewer novices. They may not know anything but as they move along, they have mentors; they surrender themselves as mentees for better people to mentor them. From there, they gather experiences, from there, they gather courage, from there; they learn to respect people, humble themselves, lead people, and do whatever a leader can do. So leadership could be made and could be born.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, as a retired Principal of a school and a politician, what is the importance of education in building leadership values, and how has it affected Nigeria as a country?

Leader: Thank you very much. You see, in whatever we want to do in this life, Education is the key. There's practically nothing we can do without education and when we talk of education, it goes beyond literacy which is reading and writing. It is unfortunate that many people think that education is limited to reading and writing. It's beyond that. Education is when you can read, you can write, can interpret, can visualize, can look into the future, and predict. You have a wide knowledge of happenings around you and even beyond. So as a leader, if you don't have this, even if you have a University degree or even Ph.D., if those other educational qualities are not in view, you're not educated. And the way it affects leadership in Nigeria as a country is that in most cases, we don't have our best hands in Authority. What I mean is that people that are well educated, people that have what it takes to lead are not given the opportunity to lead us. In most cases, many educated people believe that politics is dirty, so they don't want to 'soil' their names, they don't want people to ridicule them so they don't go into politics. The few educated ones go in there, because they're few; their voices are not heard because the majority would always carry the day. That is the major problem we have in Nigeria and until our system changes, until we have our learned people, those that are really educated and have international exposure; until we have them in the majority in government, Nigeria would still be facing a lot of challenges as par leadership.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, how did you come about your Foundation – Dorcas Foundation?

Leader: Okay, my Foundation - Omotola Dorcas Care Organization. You see, I said while I was introducing myself that I am a widow and a mother. I lost my husband for close to twenty-four years now. Around that time, I was invited to a program and the program was organized by the National Council of Women's Development and Catholic Women Organization. The two organizations collaborated to organize a seminar-workshop for young widows. So I was invited, really I felt bad, I was down, I was devastated but getting to the seminar and coming back, I was a new creature. Coming back because of all I learned there, I decided that by God's grace, whenever, I am able to sail through because it was a hard time, as a widow with four kids. First, it was very hard and tough, I promised myself and God that if I am well able to sail through and train my children, I will by all means try my best to organize young widows and use my experience to guide them, to empower them, to counsel them, to feel for them because I have passed through a lot and to God be the glory, by the time I clocked sixty years, I decided that instead of throwing a big party, I decided to invite young widows and I was able to empower them with the little I had. I gave them money, I gave that foodstuff and registered it as a body and I still meet with them every month to counsel, to pray together, to give them whatever I have. That is how I come about Omotola Dorcas Care Organization.

Gold: Thank you. Ma, what is your candid advice to the youth on leadership values?

Leader: Thank you very much. My advice to the youth on leadership values is that our youth should be

patient. They should be very patient in whatever they want to do in life. There is no need to worry about anything. At God's appointed time, what they would achieve would come to them. Then they have to be honest because honesty is the best policy. If they are truthful to one another, there would be trust and when there is trust, to lead would be easy, and to follow would be easy. The challenges we have today is because we don't trust one another and honesty is at zero level; tolerance, patience, trustworthiness, perseverance, and self-confidence. They should build confidence in themselves. They should strive; not to make attempt once or twice and forget about it. No! You keep trying. Be confident that you will make it and one day, you will make it. These are my advice to the youth. They should not shy away from taking challenges. Challenges do build people. If you are challenged and you are able to face it squarely and overcome it, you have achieved. So our youths should learn to face challenges and like I said earlier, to be fruitful in whatever they do, and to be selfless. It is service above self. If you fail or refuse to serve others, you may not be able to even serve yourself.

Gold: Thank you for your time Ma. I sincerely appreciate your wealth of wisdom and specifically your advice to the youth on leadership values.

Leader: You're welcome my dear. God bless you and I pray that by God's special grace, you will fulfill your destiny in life in Jesus Name.

Gold: Amen Ma!

My Personal Take-Homes from the interviews I conducted are:

- I. I don't have to be born into leadership to be a leader. I can become a leader by allowing myself to be trained and mentored by leaders and mentors.
- 2. To be a good leader, I must be honest, transparent, focused, and selfless in service.
- 3. I would maintain my integrity no matter how challenging it seems because a good name is better than riches.
- 4. A challenge that one goes through could be a motivation for one to ensure that others don't go through the same challenge.
- 5. I must be serious with my education, build self-confidence; be industrious, patient, tolerant, and trustworthy because:
 - (i) There is no shortcut to success.
 - (ii) No level of education can be too much for me.
